Mariya Abdulkaf '15

Social Media Manager, Video, The Verge-Vox Media New York, New York

Major at Vassar: International Studies



Mariya Abdulkaf runs social video analytics at The Verge at Vox Media. After developing and implementing a strategy for video publishing, distribution, and growth at Mashable, The Verge recruited Abdulkaf to scale its Facebook video program, optimize

videos for discovery and sharing, grow its YouTube audience, and pull analytics to inform video strategy. She also runs The Verge's experimental video platforms. Her job is part engagement editor, part producer. Abdulkaf previously worked as an investigative journalist, editor, showrunner, project manager, marketing strategist, and production coordinator. While she has had various jobs and roles (many at the same time!), working at The Verge has been one of her most enriching career experiences because of the amazing and talented team she gets to work with every day. Vox Media as a whole is an incredible place to work, and The Verge is a very special place.

Advice for the Class of 2019:

Even though graduation seems like it's so far away, it's really important to start reaching out to Vassar alumnae/i right now. Make a wish list of companies you want to work for, find alumnae/i at those companies, and reach out to them. If you want to be a journalist, reach out to 10 journalists at different media companies. If you want to be a producer, make sure you get coffee with 10 different producers. Even if you're not currently looking for a job or an internship, the media industry is so often about who you know. There are a lot of amazing Vassar grads who want to help you succeed! That's how I got my foot in the door.

Seth Armitage '98

Vice President, Senior Specialist, Head of Research, Sotheby's New York, New York Major at Vassar: Art History

Advanced Degree: MA, University of Chicago



After receiving a master's degree with a concentration in late 19th-century art from the University of Chicago, Seth Armitage joined Sotheby's in 2000. Serving as a specialist in 19th-century European art since 2004, he has catalogued each of the biannual sales, working closely with the world's preeminent art scholars,

curators, and collectors. In the process, Armitage has rediscovered a number of masterworks from the period, which have gone on to achieve world-record prices for the artists. In 2016, he was named Vice President, Senior Specialist, Head of Research, leading the sourcing and research for the sales of 19th-century European art in New York. Armitage works with active clients in Sotheby's international salerooms across a variety of departments, coordinating consignments and appraisals, and advising on acquisitions and collection-building.

Advice for the Class of 2019:

The inclusive Vassar spirit that allows students to confidently take risks and exchange a range of ideas is equally valuable in the workplace. While the professional world can appear ruthlessly competitive, you can find inspiration and success in dialogue with your colleagues; always find a way to relate to them and then make yourself heard. Look to be part of a team that is mindful and encouraging of the contributions of all members, no matter their position. Further, don't let your job title define you; find opportunities to collaborate with more experienced members of your field to gain knowledge, feedback, and opportunities. Don't ignore lateral moves—they can be chances to learn more and do new things that can propel you onward and upward.

Nicky Barber '95

Corporate Controller, Invuity Inc.

San Francisco, California Major at Vassar: Biopsychology

Advanced Degree: Certificate of Advanced Accounting

Nicky Barber is a CPA who has spent the past 17 years working in a range of operational accounting and finance roles, with a particular focus in biotech, pharmaceutical, and medical devices. Her original passion was to be a doctor, but a physical reaction to "caine" drugs cut short that career and

directed her down a more numbers-orientated path. She started her career in New York, working as the finance manager for Martha Stewart Living Omnimedia. She also enjoyed a brief stint as a trader on the Nasdaq exchange. After three years as a semiconductor analyst, she finished her accounting requirements and passed the CPA exam. In her free time, she is a competitive triathlete and has competed at both the half Ironman and full Ironman World Championships. Last year, she took six months off from work to backpack around Australia, New Zealand, and parts of Europe.

Advice for the Class of 2019:

I believe that life is meant to be lived to the fullest and that anything is possible; most of my successes have been because I started down a path that no one believed I could take. Surround yourself with positive influences and don't let the naysayers hold you back from your dreams.

Sarah Begley '12

Staff Writer, TIME magazine New York, New York Major at Vassar: English, French



Sarah Begley is a staff writer at *TIME* magazine, where she has written dozens of reviews of fiction, nonfiction, and children's literature. In addition to her books coverage, she has interviewed actors from Julie Andrews to Dwayne Johnson. She contributes to the brand's signature

franchises like TIME 100 and helps cover breaking news for the website. Prior to joining TIME in 2013, Begley worked for Newsweek. While in college she held internships at Fine Cooking and Food Network Magazine. At Vassar, she majored in English with a focus on creative writing and participated in the department's senior Creative Writing Seminar. She also majored in French and studied abroad in the Vassar-Wesleyan Program in Paris.

Advice for the Class of 2019:

Participate in internships as early and as often as you are able, and apply to a wider range than you think necessary. Once you secure an internship, build strong connections with your supervisors and make sure to check in with them frequently after you've left—you never know who they're friends with in the industry and when their connections might help you secure a job. Think creatively about how past and future internships might serve as stepping stones to an ultimate goal.

David Black '81

President, David Black Literary Agency

Brooklyn, New York Major at Vassar: Political Science



Established in 1989, the David Black Literary Agency has a reputation for representing a wide range of works, mostly nonfiction. Authors are encouraged to develop their concepts in detail before they present them to the publishing community, with the understanding that a

solid blueprint becomes the best marketing tool and gives books a better chance at success. Black and his staff negotiate contracts and act as the buffer between the author and the publisher, from the inception of the idea through the publishing process. The agency has represented dozens of bestselling authors and books. Black says, "We have the luxury of working on books that are important to us and mean something to the world."

Advice for the Class of 2019:

Build a network. Remember that most people don't settle into their careers until they have worked in numerous jobs. Use the base of alumnae/i that Vassar provides, but recognize that you are representing not only yourself but also those before you and those after you. Make connections and come prepared. Vassar graduates are proud of their school and are eager to pay it forward, but they will do so only if you are sharp, prepared, and eager to absorb what they have to offer. Vassar opens the door. What happens after you walk through it is up to you, but don't leave a trail of crumbs behind you.

Christopher Blume P'19

Managing Director, Goldman Sachs

New York, New York Major in College: Finance Advanced Degree: MBA, Wharton



Chris Blume is the chief investment officer charged with managing the portfolios of nonprofit organizations at Goldman Sachs. Prior to this role, he spent two years in Hong Kong within Goldman's Private Wealth Management division. He started his career at Goldman in 1994 as

a fixed income portfolio manager, working with a range of institutions (e.g., central banks, pension funds, insurance companies). His initial job right out of school was with JPMorgan, working within its asset management arm. He graduated *magna cum laude* in 1989 from the University of Pennsylvania and also received an MBA from Wharton in 1994. Raised in the Philadelphia area, Blume is an avid runner. He now works in New York City and lives in Summit, New Jersey.

Advice for the Class of 2019:

For sophomores at a liberal arts college, I advise three key steps in thinking about a job after graduation:

- Educate: Figure out what the possible career paths are and find out what interests you. Vassar is less pre-professional than some other schools, so you need to be very proactive.
- Credentialize: Create a track record of interest in the industry. That could be working for a professor, or just being very knowledgeable about the industry, or joining a club.
- Network: You should also remember that Vassar is a smaller school; while it might not track right into business, Vassar grads will want to help you. Just be prepared when approaching them and remember that all interactions are essentially job interviews.

Seth Bynum '15

Analyst, Benenson Strategy Group New York, New York

Major at Vassar: Economics

After graduating from Vassar, Seth Bynum interned at the New York City Department of Housing Preservation and Development its Low Income Housing Tax Credit Preservation Office. Afterwards, he took part in the Coro Fellowship in Public Affairs, an experiential

leadership development training program for aspiring change makers in New York City. Over the course of the nine-month fellowship, Bynum had six different jobs at organizations such as the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, AFSCME DC 1707, The Hudson Companies, New York Cares, and the Pratt Area Community Council; he also met with various leaders at the city, state, and federal level. Upon completion of the fellowship, he began working as an analyst at Benenson Strategy Group, a Democratic polling and strategic messaging firm that works on behalf of Democratic candidates, nonprofits, for-profits, and Fortune 500 companies. As an analyst, Bynum writes surveys, analyzes quantitative and qualitative data, and creates messaging strategies for various clients such as Verizon Wireless, Families for Excellent Schools, and a Democratic gubernatorial candidate.

Advice for the Class of 2019:

Alums, alums, alums. Begin reaching out to alums as soon as you possibly can. It doesn't matter if you don't know exactly what you want to do after college because, most likely, neither did any of the alums you are reaching out to. Contact them via LinkedIn, email, any way you possibly can and ask as many questions as you can. People love talking about themselves and they especially love it if they think it'll somehow help another person. And the people you meet and create relationships with now will become mentors, advocates, references, and maybe even bosses or co-workers later.



Tamsin Chen's work with ImpactMatters enables nonprofits to better use and produce evidence of impact, and drives donors toward nonprofits with proven impact. She oversees ImpactMatters' flagship product, the "impact audit," a

detailed report published after months of closely engaging with a nonprofit, analyzing its private and public documents and data, interviewing staff, and visiting field operations. The impact audit provides tailored, credible, third-party assessment for the nonprofit, and offers donors priceless insight into the nonprofits they seek to fund. Chen has been instrumental in bringing this new product to market and in strengthening ImpactMatters as a start-up organization. Her favorite part of the job is learning and listening to stories of positive social change in defiance of the worst of odds. At Vassar, Chen was a leader of the Vassar Haiti Project, sang with the Vassar Devils, interned on the College Committee on Sustainability, and made granola and friends in Ferry House.

Advice for the Class of 2019:

The best opportunity to take is not always going to be the most high-paying, most respectable, or most sensible one. Take time at Vassar to learn about people living on the margins, and the unconventional life choices you can make; take time to listen to and make room for them in the world.

Karen V. Clopton '80

Chief Administrative Law Judge, California Public Utilities Commission

San Francisco, California

Major at Vassar: Political Science, Hispanic Studies Advanced Degree: JD, Antioch School of Law



Karen V. Clopton is the first African American to be appointed Chief Administrative Law Judge for the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC). She manages the Administrative Law Judge Division, which employs over 100 people, including over 40 judges. The commission charged her with conducting a

"soup to nuts" review of the CPUC's decision-making processes in January 2009, and she exceeded every expectation with her thorough research, review, and recommendations. The commission has embraced her many initiatives to make its crucial regulatory work more accessible to the public, more transparent, and more efficient. currently the lead researcher on two projects. In her first independent project, using a rodent model, she investigated if paternal cocaine exposure affects the behavior of offspring. She separated the mice by sex and conducted a battery of behavioral tests to establish endophenotypes. She contributed substantially to the manuscript, of which she is co-first author with Richard Rice '13. The manuscript is currently under review for publication in Brain and Behavior. She has also been examining intellectual disability (ID) related to cereblon, a gene linked to a non-syndromic, autosomal recessive type of ID in humans. She has been using the cereblon knockout (Crbn-/-) transgenic mouse model, an animal model that behaviorally mirrors the human condition. She is investigating the development of hippocampal circuitry that could be underlying ID-related behavioral deficits in Crbn-/- mice. She is using different molecular tools to investigate alterations in hippocampal formation and synaptogenesis.

Advice for the Class of 2019:

If you are interested in research and possibly pursuing a PhD, seeking a position as a technician in a lab or applying for a post-bac position is a great idea, so you can become immersed in research and confirm that this is the right path for you.

Dr. Judith Grinspan has been a faculty member at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and the University of Pennsylvania for 27 years. Her laboratory uses cellular and molecular techniques to study the development of myelin, the membrane that coats

nerve processes in the central and peripheral nervous system and ensures proper conduction of nervous impulses. Lack of myelin, seen in diseases such as multiple sclerosis and cerebral palsy, causes deficits in motor and/or cognitive function. The Grinspan lab focuses on facilitating regeneration of myelin from stem cells using tissue culture models, genetic models, and disease models. These studies have identified proteins, altered in the central nervous system during disease, that interfere with myelination. Through its studies, the Grinspan lab has trained undergraduates, graduate students, and postdoctoral fellows to be the next generation of neuroscientists and science advocates. Dr. Grinspan also serves on hospital and university committees for academic engagement, education, and infrastructure, as well as national and international scientific review panels. She is also active in national scientific societies in her area.

Advice for the Class of 2019:

Attending Vassar gives you the opportunity to study in a small classroom setting with teachers who really care about teaching. You can study one area in depth and at the same time become broadly educated in the arts and sciences. Take advantage of the rich cultural life on campus. Take advantage of the diversity of students to make friends with people unlike yourself. Get academic help in your courses if you need it. If you are interested in medicine, try working in the lab of one of your professors. You may get hooked or discover it's not for you. This is the time in your life to figure out who you are.

entire career at Sidley. He has filed more than 50 briefs in the United States Supreme Court, and his clients have prevailed in cases he argued before the United States Courts of Appeals for the Second, Sixth, and Eleventh Circuits, as well as before the New York State Supreme Court, Appellate Division. Joyce has briefed appeals in nearly every federal appellate court and argued many critical motions in trial courts. He has a busy pro bono practice, including current representations of two death-row defendants and many past representations in civil rights litigation.

Advice for the Class of 2019:

Think carefully and critically when making career-oriented choices, but more importantly, realize that they are not permanent—you can and should revisit them as your interests, needs, and life change. Much like your time at Vassar, it is not the course names that will make your graduate education and life in the working world exciting and fulfilling; rather, it's the people teaching you and working alongside you. Should you choose to pursue a career in law, remember to give back. The skills you develop as a lawyer are special and empowering; put them to use to serve the less fortunate whenever you can.

If research is your preference, get a master's and/or PhD. Become broadly educated. Then find "your" topic and specialize in it when doing the PhD work. Your choice determines your market value. Always ask yourself, talk to others—what can I do with what I am good at? Publish your research. Attend conferences. Build a network as early as possible.

Failure is never fatal. It is the courage to continue on that counts."

Dr. Eve E. Slater is Professor of Clinical Medicine at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons (P&S), where she has taught for over 35 years. She is board certified in internal medicine and cardiology, and a fellow of the American College

of Cardiology. Dr. Slater received her BA (Phi Beta Kappa) from Vassar in 1967, her MD (Alpha Omega Alpha) from P&S, and residency and fellowship training at the Massachusetts General Hospital, where she was the first woman chief resident in medicine, and later led the hypertension unit, as assistant professor of medicine at Harvard Medical School. She has been senior vice president, Worldwide Policy, Pfizer, Inc. Prior to that, she served as assistant secretary for health in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, and spent over 19 years with Merck and Co. as executive director of biochemistry and molecular biology, and later, senior vice president of Clinical and Regulatory Development, and SVP of External Policy. Many of Merck's drugs, including statins, vaccines, and HIV/AIDS medicines, received worldwide regulatory approval during her tenure, and she supervised drug safety, during which time no FDA-mandated labeling changes were required.

Advice for the Class of 2019:

Please use your time liberally to sample courses—ones that you know you will love but also ones about which you know little. Choose some friends who will explore with you. Discard preconceived notions. Question the conventional wisdom; where possible create constructive alternatives. Listen to all points of view. Try to find the truth in each of them. College, if possible, should allow you the freedom to find what you will love to do in life. Be relentless in your search. Vassar will provide the choices and the environment.

Since co-founding Starr Whitehouse Landscape Architects and Planners, Starr has continued to expand on the Olmstedian themes she absorbed in Central Park, choreographing and sequencing the experience and stewardship of the landscape from tiny urban courtyards to vulnerable stretches of the waterfront. Participating in the mayor's post-Sandy Special Initiative for Rebuilding and Resiliency (SIRR), Starr promoted the idea of integrating flood protection into a vibrant new waterfront—ideas that later earned her the nickname "mid-wife" of the Big U, a winning proposal in HUD's Rebuild by Design (RBD) competition.

Career Guidebook Definitions

Résumés

Strong résumés are targeted to a specific opportunity and bring out a candidate's key credentials, skills, interests, and accomplishments. Generally limited to one page in length, a résumé should provide contact information, summarize your educational and professional history, and highlight additional skill sets and leadership capabilities. To get help with your résumé, drop by the CDO at any time between 2:00 and 4:00pm, Monday through Friday. The CDO's Résumé Writing and Job Search Correspondence Guide provides useful tips on format and content, and provides examples of successful résumés.

Cover Letters

Cover letters are persuasive documents that highlight a candidate's skills, knowledge of the employer, and ability to contribute to the organization. Simply put, a cover letter is an opportunity for you to interpret your résumé and highlight why you are a strong candidate. The CDO's Résumé Writing and Job Search Correspondence Guide provides useful tips on format and content, and provides examples of successful cover letters.

Interviews

Interviews are two-way conversations by which employers evaluate a candidate's skills, motivation, goals, and personality. Usually granted to applicants who stand out on paper, interviews help an employer determine whether an individual would be a good fit for their organization. Interviews also allow applicants insight into potential workplaces. To learn more about polishing your interviewing skills, contact the CDO to schedule a mock interview with a career counselor.

Networking and Informational Interviews

One of the best ways to explore career options and plan your job search is to talk directly with people who work in fields that interest you. Informational interviewing adds a dynamic, personalized dimension to your career research—and can help you approach your internship in a strategic, focused manner. Vassar alumnae/i have a strong track record of helping current students advance their career goals. Use our networking resources (on the opposite page) to learn more about a specific industry, occupation, or organization; get advice on how to break into or advance in a given industry; or explore graduate and professional school programs.

Thank-You Notes

Thank-you notes are expected by employers and networking contacts as an appropriate method to extend your appreciation for an individual's time and attention. It is also a strategic way to emphasize your professionalism and differentiate yourself. Always follow up with a thank-you note (or email) after every professional interaction.

Career Guidebook—CDO Resources

The Career Development Office

The Career Development Office (CDO) helps students and alumnae/i envision and realize a meaningful life after Vassar. We support members of the Vassar community as they explore their interests, define their career goals, and seek their next opportunity for personal growth and professional development. Located in Main-South (Room 170), CDO staff can help you find internships, review résumés and cover letters, network effectively, and prepare for interviews. The office also offers career assessment and graduate/law school advising services, hosts regular workshops and on-campus recruiting events, brings employers and graduate schools to campus, and administers internship funding. To take advantage of these resources, schedule a half-hour appointment with a career counselor—or visit the office between 2:00 and 4:00pm, Monday through Friday, for a drop-in appointment.

Online Internship Resources

The CDO operates, subscribes to, and recommends a number of useful online resources for internship searching. We encourage you to begin your internship search with the CDO's Vassar-connected resources. Available solely to the Vassar community and updated daily, VCLink is a database of job and internship opportunities for which employers explicitly seek Vassar students. Resources accessible through VCLink include the Liberal Arts Career Network (LACN) and the Nationwide Internship Consortium (NIC), both of which draw upon a network of 38+ selective liberal arts colleges across the nation. In addition to highlighting specific internships, a number of our resources offer informational (often industry and company-specific) content and advice on finding internships outside the U.S. For a full list of recommended online resources, consult the Internship Resource Directory. Networking Tools

Sophomore Career Connections is not your only opportunity to network with members of the Vassar community. As a student or alumna/us, you have access to the Vassar network through a handful of convenient online tools. The Alumnae/i Directory, operated by the Office of Alumnae/i Affairs and Development (OAAD), allows you to search for and (professionally) contact nearly 40,000 Vassar graduates. Nearly 20,000 Vassar graduates currently use LinkedIn; set up a free account to connect with people who inspire you! Finally, Vassar's growing AlumniFire network offers another way to identify and contact community members who are willing to help and advise current students.

Funding Opportunities

Many internship programs are unpaid or underpaid. To help make financially inaccessible opportunities a reality, the CDO administers a number of funds every year. Through the Internship Grant Fund (IGF), a need-sensitive program open to students from all class years, the CDO supports students participating in low-pay and unpaid summer internships. Whether you require assistance to cover rent for the summer, or simply need a transit card to get from your home to the office, consider applying to the IGF after rolling admissions open in March. Open to juniors only, the highly competitive Tananbaum Fellowship helps 20 juniors find their dream summer opportunity through comprehensive career coaching and a generous stipend.
